Q1. (a) Find the inverse of this matrix using row operations. [10]

$$A := \begin{pmatrix} 0 & -1 & -1 & -1 \\ 0 & 1 & -1 & 1 \\ -1 & -1 & 1 & 1 \\ 1 & 0 & 1 & -1 \end{pmatrix}$$

(b) Deduce the null space and image space of A . [2]

Q2. (a) Determine the eigenvalues and eigenvectors of this matrix [10]

$$C := \frac{1}{40} \begin{pmatrix} 38 & -12 & 12 \\ -117 & -22 & -18 \\ -234 & 36 & -76 \end{pmatrix}$$

(b) Calculate $C \begin{pmatrix} 2 \\ 6 \\ -7 \end{pmatrix}$ and explain why we get this relation. [2]

Q3. (a) What is the intersection of these two planes? Check your answer. [7]

$$P_1 : \begin{pmatrix} x \\ y \\ z \end{pmatrix} \circ \begin{pmatrix} 3 \\ 4 \\ 2 \end{pmatrix} = -5, \quad P_2 : \begin{pmatrix} x \\ y \\ z \end{pmatrix} \circ \begin{pmatrix} -5 \\ -2 \\ 6 \end{pmatrix} = 3$$

(b) Where does the line $\begin{pmatrix} x \\ y \\ z \end{pmatrix} = \begin{pmatrix} 3 \\ 0 \\ -1 \end{pmatrix} + k \begin{pmatrix} 2 \\ -7 \\ 4 \end{pmatrix}$ pass through the planes? [3]

(c) Give the distance from the origin to the intersection point in the previous part. [2]

Q4. (a) What is the quadratic equation which best fits this data? [8]

$$\begin{array}{c|cccc} x_i & -2 & -1 & 1 & 2 \\ \hline y_i & \frac{1}{2} & \frac{-7}{2} & \frac{-1}{2} & \frac{3}{2} \end{array}$$

(b) How big is the difference between the quadratic and the given y_i ? [2]

(c) Could there be a cubic curve which passes through all four points? [2]

Q5. (a) Explain why $Y := 2A - A^T$ is defined only for square matrices A and Y is symmetric if and only if A is symmetric. [4]

(b) (i) Solve this equation in general: $(X(B^T - 3C))^T = 2B$. [2]

(ii) Find X and verify your answer is correct using these values: [3]

$$B := \begin{pmatrix} 1 & 3 \\ -1 & 2 \end{pmatrix}, \quad C := \begin{pmatrix} 2 & -1 \\ -4 & 2 \end{pmatrix}$$

(iii) Explain three different ways that the equation can have no solution. [3]

Q6. (a) Give $\underline{w} := \begin{pmatrix} -2 \\ 5 \\ 5 \\ 4 \end{pmatrix}$ in terms of $\underline{e}_1 := \begin{pmatrix} 2 \\ 5 \\ 1 \\ 2 \end{pmatrix}$ and $\underline{v}_2 := \begin{pmatrix} 4 \\ 5 \\ -1 \\ 1 \end{pmatrix}$ but show that

$\underline{v}_3 := \begin{pmatrix} 2 \\ 3 \\ 0 \\ -1 \end{pmatrix}$ is not in the space spanned by \underline{e}_1 and \underline{v}_2 . [6]

(b) Use Gram-Schmidt to find \underline{e}_2 from \underline{v}_2 and then find an \underline{e}_3 from \underline{v}_3 orthogonal to both \underline{e}_1 and \underline{e}_2 and check your answers. [6]

Q7. (a) What is the determinant of this matrix? $J := \begin{pmatrix} 2 & x & 4 \\ 2 & 2 & 1 \\ y & 1 & -1 \end{pmatrix}$ [4]

(b) Under what conditions for y will J be singular? Which x and y values will never give singular matrices? [4]

(c) Determine the inverse of J in the general case by the determinant method. [4]

Q8. (a) Check all three subspace axioms for this set: $\left\{ \begin{pmatrix} x \\ y \end{pmatrix}; y = 2x - 6 \text{ or } y = \frac{x}{2} \right\}$. [4]

(b) Find the dot product form of the plane containing the points $u := \begin{pmatrix} 2 \\ 3 \\ 2 \end{pmatrix}$, $v :=$

$\begin{pmatrix} 1 \\ 1 \\ 2 \end{pmatrix}$ and $w := \begin{pmatrix} -1 \\ -2 \\ 1 \end{pmatrix}$. Find one reason why it is not a subspace of \mathbb{R}^3 . [5]

(c) What is the dimension of the subspace with equation $w - 3x + 2y - 7z = 0$? [3]
